

On Red Team's first day of service, they worked with another youth service camp called YCS to clean up a portion of the Guadalupe River. # Women in STEM

Science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) were traditionally viewed as very masculine subjects, and they have remained predominantly male fields for generations. Women were diverted from that path of study, and encouraged to go into more “feminine” jobs. Even today, as society strives to close the gender gap, women only make up only around 24% of STEM workers. Females in STEM workplaces face relentless sexism and harassment, and are often paid less than their male coworkers. These problems may have been caused by stereotypes pressed onto many young girls, such as, “girls don’t like math,” or “girls will find science boring.” The blatant gender inequality in STEM fields must be addressed and dealt with by supporting women in STEM career paths and interests, and working to close the wage gap in both STEM jobs and other occupations.


Only 26% of women who receive STEM degrees actually occupy a STEM position, as opposed to 40% of men. Even if they get the job, most women are only paid around 85% of men’s pay in the same field. While the gender pay gap is less than the one in other fields, it still presents an unjust inequality in STEM workforces. In the workplace, females are often subjected to sexist comments or actions. Nobel scientist Sir Tim Hunt stated in an interview “Let me tell you about my trouble with girls ... three things happen when they are in the lab ... You fall in love with them, they fall in love with you and when you criticize them, they cry”. Comments like these highlight the gender stereotypes in STEM fields. Women responded to this criticism on social media with pictures of them in work environments as they “try not to cry,” or “fall in love.”



One possible factor of the underrepresentation of women is the stereotypes imposed onto girls from a young age. Gendered marketing and stereotypical characterizations of women in movies reinforce the idea that STEM jobs are for men. Girl toys tend to involve dolls, or dress up, which doesn't exactly encourage interest in science or technology. In movies, the ratio of men to women shown in STEM occupations is 7:1. The lack of female STEM role models also may contribute to less girls being interested in science or technology.

To close the gender gap, efforts must be made to promote interest in STEM subjects in girls. Offer more STEM classes, and work to discourage gender roles in schools and camps. Instead of pushing girls into stereotypes and generalizations, let them choose their own interests. Already, programs are appearing that support girls in technology and math. Hopefully, the gender inequality in STEM fields can be diminished and eventually erased in future years.



Also, in such areas, there is a lack of fresh produce. In Stockton there is a small farm that grows fruit and vegetables. First of all you might be wondering what the New Generation Nikkei Fund (NGNF) is. NGNF is a fund that looks for Japantown organizations that engage in projects that are innovative and/or non-traditional. NGNF is supported by another organization called AAPIP. AAPIP supports many other organizations, for example LGBTQ organizations, leadership development programs, and many more. The CEO or Deputy Director of AAPIP is Cynthia Choi.

NGNF focuses on encouraging a culture of giving and volunteerism among Japanese American and Asian American young people. Also NGNF is on a mission to improve collaboration and communication among Japantowns and other large Nikkei communities. Lastly NGNF is trying to support Japan towns or Nikkei community organizations, as well as donate some money to these communities and a new generation of donors. One additional project the NGNF has is retrofitting the buildings in the Japantown area in San Jose Downtown area. This way when the big one starts to destroy businesses and homes, their community will be ready and the buildings will be there for generations to come.

Japantown was started in 1890 and is still located today between Jackson and Taylor east of Sixth Street. Japantown was started when the Japanese people started to immigrate to America. Japantown was a place where all the Japanese people felt equal because they were looked down upon by the white people because they worked as farmers. Japantown looked like it came out of Japan during that era. Most of the Japanese people lived there and created their own community, some of the original families still go to Japantown today! There are only three authentic Japantowns left to this very day in the U.S.; the Japantowns are located in San Jose, San Francisco, and Los Angeles.

These communities survived the demolition during urban renewal in the 1950's and 1960's and the forced evacuation and imprisonment of Japanese Americans in concentration camps during World War II. Here is a fun fact for you; did you know that San Jose's Japantown is the largest in the United States, but it's so tiny!

# LGBT Ruling and Response

On June 26th, 2015, the Supreme Court of the United States passed a landmark ruling to legalize gay marriage in every state of America. This decision was very important to this country, comparable to the Brown vs. BOE ruling among others. Many states denied the rights to marry for LGBT folks until it was required to allow it.

While the couples and advocates outside and around the country celebrated and cried happily, other parties were not as excited. For instance, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons) stated, "While showing respect for those who think differently, the Church will continue to teach and promote marriage between a man and a woman as a central part of our doctrine and practice." As a religious group, the Mormons decided that the better option for marriage under their jurisdiction was heterosexual. Also, Archbishop Joseph Kurtz, who is the president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, felt that the decision of the Supreme Court was a "tragic error", but reached out to Catholics to accept the ruling. Some states are fighting back against marriage equality. For example, in Texas, "clerks can refuse based on religious objections, and...numerous lawyers stand ready to assist clerks defending their religious beliefs,"

The political response was quite different, however, with some Democrats, such as Bernie Sanders and Hillary Clinton, responding happily to the news unlike Republicans such as Jeb Bush slamming the decision. In my opinion, citizens of the U.S.A. should be allowed to be of any sexual orientation that they desire because anybody who lives here deserves to be who they truly are. Marriage is a civil practice that should not be influenced by religion. The separation of church and state has allowed us to get as far as we are currently. # What is Animal Abuse?

Animal Abuse is a form of cruelty that involves someone hurting or harming an animal that they are (or not) responsible for. Examples of Animal Abuse include beating or starving a pet, or keeping an animal in an unfriendly and, or wrong environment.

## Extreme Animal Abuse

### Dog Fighting

People force dogs to fight each other, often with thousands of dollars at stake. If the dogs don't fight to the death, then the losing dog is often killed. Dogs who are used for fighting are usually kept penned or chained (often with heavy logging chains), and many are taunted and starved in order to trigger extreme survival instincts and encourage aggression. Many dogs are injected with steroids, and some dogfighters even sharpen their dogs' teeth, cut off their ears (to prevent another dog from latching on), and add roach poison to their food so that their fur might taste bad to other dogs.

### Product Testing

Did you know that many of the products you and your family use every day are still tested on animals? Cosmetics like toothpaste and mascara are typically tested on rabbits and guinea pigs. Worldwide, Rabbits, Guinea Pigs, Hamsters, and Mice are routinely Blinded, Poisoned, and even killed to test new cosmetic products. In CHINA alone, an estimated 300,000 animals die each year in cosmetic tests. In order to buy animal friendly cosmetic products, check out [www.leapingbunny.org](http://www.leapingbunny.org). What are signs that someone is abusing an animal?

1. Hoarding: A person who keeps far more animals than they can properly care for is a hoarder. This can be abusive because animals need significant care and handling and having too many animals may mean the hoarder cannot care for all of them.

2.Lack of veterinary care: Untreated wounds are a red flag that demand immediate attention; emaciation, scabs and hair loss can also be a sign of untreated underlying diseases.

3.Inadequate shelter, especially in extreme heat or cold temperatures, can be deadly to pets.

4.Chained dogs who are tethered continuously suffer tremendously, both from social isolation and exposure to predators and the elements.

5.Abandonment: A startling number of animals die every year when people move out of their residences and simply leave the animals behind. Sometimes, an abandoned dog's barking or cat's howling can alert the neighbors, but it's wise to keep an eye on a recently vacated home, especially if the former residents moved suddenly.

6.Direct Violence:It can be very upsetting to see someone beating or physically attacking an animal, but it's important not to turn away.

What steps do I take when I see an animal being abused?

Unfortunately, Animal Cruelty happens all the time. If you see an animal being abused stay calm and take these steps.

1. Don't get involved. When you see someone abusing an animal, trying to stop them will probably put you in a dangerous situation.

2. If needed, find a trusted adult and call 911. Animal Abuse is a serious crime and Animal Control should be notified immediately.



Women face most problems in a workplace, for example, single women with children make 60% of what men make. Even in the military, women are not allowed in the front lines. Also, women hold under 17% of the seats in congress, and although more women attend college, more women are illiterate. Even in sports, women have a huge disadvantage. In the 2015 women's soccer world cup, the teams were forced to play on an artificial turf and had to share the same hotel and training facilities, while the men didn't even have to share the same city and played on real grass.

Clearly, gender inequality-- and not just feminism-- is controversial. There are multiple ways to fix it, but it has to start at a young age. Kids should be taught in school that men and women, boys and girls are equal. Also, most of this discrimination happens in a workplace, where women get paid less and are clearly a minority. Ways to fix this can start in interview questions. When asked what salary they should receive, statistics show that women tend to ask for less money. People grow up seeing inequality right in front of them and go along with it because that's what they learned it as.

But the reality is that it shouldn't be this way. Over the years, changes have been made and equality for women and men is better, but it shouldn't be a problem at all. Part of this problem also comes from a lack of women in important roles in the government and large corporations. Overall, gender inequality can only be fixed with time and open-minds.
